Learn about the Lion and ROAR



Materials: construction paper, scissors, glue, paint, popsicle stick

Using washable paint, make footprints to create different animals. Have your child add stripes, a mane, tail, etc. with crayons or paint. You can also add googly eyes or draw eyes onto the animal.



Materials: construction paper, scissors, glue, brown paint/ marker

Cut out yellow pieces for the giraffe’s body, head, neck, and ears. Then cut out finger holes in the body. Have your child glue pieces on. Add a face and then use paint fingerprints to create a pattern on the giraffe.
